EMERGENCY ROOMS

- Equipped to handle lifethreatening situations.
- Open 24 hours, 7 days a week. Staff trained to treat trauma
- and acute conditions.

FREE-STANDING EMERGENCY ROOM

- FSERs are physically separate
- Same staffing as at an ER. You receive emergency care and pay emergency room prices.


URGENT CARE CENTERS

- Staffed with full medical team.
- Extended hours with no appointments needed.
- Typically have on-site labs, X-rays and can perform minor surgical procedures.
